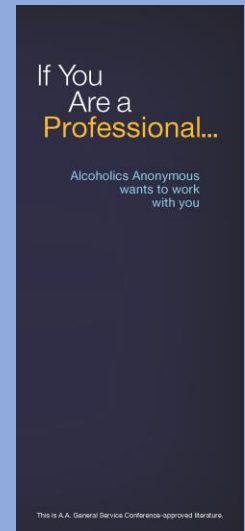
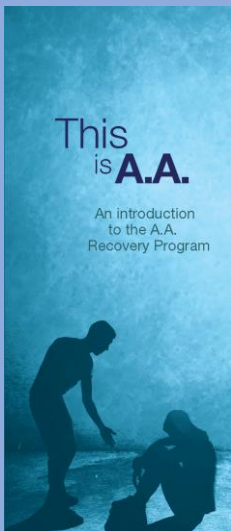


Workplace Problem Drinker

If you are an employer or coworker of someone who has a problem with alcohol, then AA might be able to help. The A.A. approach is based on the ability of recovered alcoholics to help those who are still drinking. A.A. can help organizations, corporations and businesses, regardless of size, contact men and women who have achieved sobriety, and are willing to share their experience freely with anyone who seeks help.

You can take some action to assist in recovery by developing an understanding of the A.A. program. A.A. has literature specific to the problem drinker in the workplace. The entirety of Chapter 10 (pages 136-150) in Alcoholics Anonymous' "Big Book" is devoted to employers. We also have several pamphlets that can help shed more light on the issue of Alcoholism and AA's program of recovery.
