Step Ten: Adopting a New Value System

I spent most of my adolescent years attempting to get the attention and the approval of the people around me, and it seldom worked out the way I planned it. The harder I tried, the worse it got. Why didn't they appreciate my wit and wisdom? The more I was rejected the more bizarre I behaved, and this began a misguided approach to my decision making. I had formulated my own concept of right and wrong and did things to be

unique, but I never got the respect I was seeking. I seldom did anything that I could lay claim to for myself except for those misguided escapades. This was true before I ever drank a drop of alcohol, and even more so throughout my drinking days.

When I entered Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.), I identified with just about everything I had read and heard, and I began to recognize where I went wrong in my youth. I realized that I had no direction in my life, no moral compass to speak of, and that the failure in my personal relations manifested itself in low self-esteem (self-loathing). I felt inferior, unworthy, disrespected, isolated, unappreciated, disliked, etc. etc. I was going to have to depend on something outside of myself to govern my judgment and my decision making.

STEP TEN

Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it

One of the biggest misconceptions in the rooms of A.A. is that when we do a Tenth Step (write it or speak it to another), it involves the "when we retire at night" inventory found on page 86 of the Big Book. That particular inventory is actually found in Step Eleven. Step Ten very clearly lays out our need to continue to look at ourselves throughout our day being aware when we find that, in the moment, we are being selfish and self-centered once again; when we are telling little (or not so little) white lies once again; when we are harboring resentments against our fellows once again; and when we find ourselves being fearful about our lives once again.



I thas been said that one of the best descriptions of "What a sober day looks like" is found in the Tenth Step promises (Big Book, Page 84 - 4th Edition). Through our willingness to continue to look at ourselves throughout the day, we can use the text below to begin to embrace the basic foundations of what a sober day can look like for us.

Tenth Step Promises:

And we have ceased fighting anything or anyone—even alcohol. For by this time sanity will have returned. We will seldom be interested in liquor. If tempted, we recoil from it as from a hot flame. We react sanely and normally, and we will find that this has happened automatically. We will see that our new attitude toward liquor has been given us without any thought or effort on our part. It just comes! That is the miracle of it. We are not fighting it, neither are we avoiding temptation. We feel as though we have been placed in a position of neutrality—safe and protected. We have not even sworn off. Instead, the problem has been removed. It does not exist for us. We are neither cocky nor are we afraid. That is our experience. That is how we react so long as we keep in fit spiritual condition.





Meeting Guide App Update

As of August 2023 there were over 150,000 meetings listed on the Meeting Guide App, covering most of the United States and several foreign countries. Those meetings represent the input of 527 central offices, areas, and districts.

SEPIA was the first large intergroup to join the app and worked closely with the developer to optimize the code so that any A.A. entity could easily add their information, free of charge.

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A tip for submitting meetings:

For submitting online meetings that use the Zoom platform, GSO and SEPIA recommend the following:

Avoid using the short URL "https://zoom.us/join" as it may cause difficulties for members joining meetings.

Instead, provide a one-click join link that embeds the meeting ID and encrypted passcode into the URL. This can be found on your meeting invitation.



A Brief History of the Meeting Guide App

- 2013—Josh R., a web developer living in New York, moves to San Jose, CA, thinking the change will help him to drink less.
- The move doesn't help, but A.A. does. Josh gets sober with the help of the fellowship. While looking up meetings, Josh discovers that the local Intergroup's website does not work well on mobile phones.
- Using a spreadsheet of meeting listings, Josh develops a simple app for his personal use. The Intergroup Rep from his homegroup suggests he expand it and make it available to the whole county.
- Josh and the Santa Clara County Intergroup do so. Josh goes further and develops a "plug in"—a tool that all intergroup/ central offices, areas, and districts across the country (and the world) can use to upload their meetings to the new app.
- November, 2015—The free app launched nationwide in with seven connected A.A. websites.
- 2018: The app takes off; Josh gifts it to A.A. World Services for free to help members everywhere connect with A.A.

One of the first default positions I would take to surrender to these new realities was to concede to the fact that, my brain does not process information properly, and that I was going to have to trust in something more reliable.

While reading a book on economics, the author stated that "a man who lives by principles has 99% of his decisions already made for him". With that in mind, I began to establish a system of principles that are consistent with the A.A. program, and, I might add, with most of the other successful philosophies of life. I would read the St. Francis Prayer in the *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions* ("12&12") daily. I attend a Step study meeting weekly to reinforce these principles. I try to make sure that I am not modifying these standards to evade the tougher actions.

RECOVERY IS ABOUT CHANGING ME

One day, I was carping and complaining about another member of our group, to one of my mentors at that time, and he suggested that I try to place principles before personalities. I responded, yes, but I do not agree with his principles. He then said, it was not his principles that we are talking about, but that it was my principles. He then informed me that we cannot be selective about to whom and when we apply these values. I must treat everyone with respect, and that goes for the smallest, innocent child to the most errant rogue that I might encounter. I know that it seems like an impossible task, but I assure you that if you start with the child and work your way to the rogue, it will get easier, if you do not cave into your ego. One day at a time I practice these new-found principles over and over until they become common-place and these new principles and values have served me well.

Tradition Ten (Long Form)

No A.A. group or member should ever, in such a way as to implicate A.A., express any opinion on outside controversial issues—particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion. The Alcoholics Anonymous groups oppose no one. Concerning such matters they can express no views whatever.


Key takeaway from this tradition: Outside issues can tear us apart

A.A. entities like groups and central offices have never become a crusaders or taken stands on important but outside issues, "particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion". We have prospered by having no opinion on outside matters and not being drawn into controversy. A.A. has avoided the outside political issues that have torn apart other organizations in the past, including the secular sobriety movement The Washingtonians.*

Bill Wilson differentiates the responsibilities of the A.A. member and the A.A. group in this tradition by saying on p. 177 of the Twelve and Twelve that the Tenth tradition does not "mean that the members of Alcoholics Anonymous, now restored as citizens of the world, are going to back away from their individual responsibilities to act as they see the right upon issues of our time. But when it comes to A.A. as a whole, that's quite a different matter. In this respect, we do not enter into public controversy because we know that our society will perish if it does."

*The Washingtonians were a 19th-century temperance movement composed of "drunkards" (the word alcoholic had not been invented yet) who formed a fellowship to help each other stay sober. At first they enjoyed tremendous success and a membership of up to 600,000 people. But the movement collapsed when the Washingtonians lost their singleness of purpose and got involved with political and social causes, like prohibition and abolition, which tore them apart from within. The movement also took official stances on hotbutton issues that caused public opinion, which initially was positive, to turn against them as well. They disappeared in a matter of years.



Concept Ten (Long Form)

Every service responsibility should be matched by an equal service authority - the scope of such authority to be always well defined whether by tradition, by resolution, by specific job description, by appropriate charters or by legal instruments

In other words: Clarity of roles, responsibility and authority is vital

The company you work (or worked) for likely believes this as well. No effective and successful business can run without it. A.A. has gone to great lengths to ensure there is final/ultimate authority and to define where it lies should any "course correction" ever be needed.

This Concept suggests that providing trusted servants with clearly defined jobs and the authority to do those jobs is equally important.

This is where the idea of the "group conscience" as ultimate authority and the "trusted servant" as delegated authority clearly cross paths and need each other to function.

COOPERATION WITH THE PROFESSIONAL COMMUNITY (CPC)

The CPC Committee recently took several medical, nursing, and/or psychology students from Drexel to A.A. meetings so that the students could learn what A.A. is, what it is not, and what it does, so that they can better help suffering alcoholics when they graduate.

As part of their class assignment, the students wrote essays about what they learned. Here is one that was shared with us.

A.A. Reflection

My first impression of attending an AA meeting was that I immediately understood why so many people enjoy the meetings and why the meetings so successfully aid in many people's sobriety journeys. The more meetings I attended, the more this impression amplified. The feeling of each meeting I attended, whether virtual or in-person, was one of unconditional support; where people could be extraordinarily vulnerable to others confronting similar struggles; and where one can maintain hope in the face of a devastating, all-encompassing disease.

Before coming to medical school, I had many years of experience working with people with opioid use disorder. As I am interested in pursuing addiction psychiatry, I hoped to learn more about another substance use disorder – alcohol use disorder – through this program. I learned about challenges specific to trying to achieve or maintain sobriety from alcohol; not only is alcohol legal, it is present in the vast majority of social situations. A certain level of intoxication from alcohol is normalized by society. It is therefore very difficult, if not impossible, to cut oneself off from any access to alcohol.

The biggest draw I saw to regularly attending AA meetings is the social support. I learned in these meetings that substance use disorders inevitably end up isolating the person as the disease escalates. In an AA meeting, when a person talks about the effects of alcohol in their life or what it's like to be a recovering alcoholic, it makes others feel less alone. When someone expresses their feelings and receives affirmation from others, the burden of pain is lessened, whether slightly or more significantly.

The other interesting and sometimes controversial aspect of AA is the "higher power." As an observant Jew, I was initially put off by the step of submitting to a "higher power" and the mandatory communal serenity prayer. However, the more meetings I attended, the more I understood this "higher power" is just a vehicle for spirituality that aids in many people's journey to sobriety. It is actually inclusive as a "higher power" is subjective according to a person's belief system. It's not for everyone, but if someone does find meaning and connection in spirituality, this can be a useful tool in pursuit of recovery. I feel very lucky to have experienced these meetings in that I believe it has helped me better understand my future patients afflicted with this disease. —A.







THIS MONTH IN A.A. HISTORY

*** OCTOBER ***



October 1, 1957—A. A. Comes of Age: A Brief History of Alcoholics Anonymous is published. In it, A.A. co-founder Bill W. tells the story of the growth of Alcoholics Anonymous from its make-or-break beginnings in New York and Akron in the early 1930s to its spread across the country and overseas in the years that followed. Bill also recounts the evolution of the Twelve Steps, the Twelve Traditions and the Twelve Concepts for World Service — those principles and practices that protect A.A.s Three Legacies of Recovery, Unity and Service

October 2, 1944—The National Committee for Education on Alcoholism was formed by Marty M., one of the first women to get sober in A.A. It still exists today as the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence (NCADD), which provides "education, information, help and hope to the public", according to their website, https://ncadd.us/.

October 3, 1945—AA Grapevine was adopted as the official national publication of A.A.

October 5, 1988—Lois W, Bill W.'s wife and a co-founder of Al-Anon, died at age 97 in Mount Kisco, NY.

October 10, 1988—Lois was buried next to Bill in Manchester, Vermont, near where he grew up.

October 9th-11th, 1969—The first World Service meeting was held in New York with delegates from 14 countries.

October 13, 1947—The Melbourne Group held its first meeting in Australia.

October 20, 1928—Bill wrote a promise to Lois in the family Bible to quit drinking. By Thanksgiving he added a second promise.

October 22, 1963—Elvin Morton Jellinek, alcoholism researcher and educator, died at the age of 73. He coined the expression "the disease concept of alcoholism", and his research significantly accelerated the movement towards the medicalization of alcohol habituation. His initial 1946 study was funded by Marty Mann (see above) and used the experiences of volunteers from A.A. to create the "Jellinek Curve", to detail five stages of alcoholism. He was also the first person to identify the "placebo effect" in medicine.



October 24, 1942—The L.A. Times reports there are A.A. groups in 14 California cities.

1950: The *Reader's Digest* publishes an article on A.A.: *Double -Barreled Hope for Alcoholics*.

- Members can and should share their experience at meetings and among friends.


Why is it important?

Interphones

Who answers the phones when the office is closed?

When folks reach out for help outside of the normal business hours of the Intergroup Office, the trained and informed volunteers of the Interphones Committee are available to answer the call. SEPIA's telephone system automatically transfers the calls to those who have signed up to be available at that time. There are always 5 volunteers on each shift. First phone to pick up answers the call. Your information will NOT show up on the caller ID. Your anonymity is assured!! One year of continuous sobriety is required. Here is a list of the shifts:

All seven (7) days are available from 5pm—9pm; 9 pm—Midnight; Midnight to 9 am; Two extra shifts on Saturdays and Sundays from 9 am -1 pm and 1 pm to 5 pm. Choose which day of the week works best for you!

There is one meeting for training and the committee meets on the **last Wednesday** of the **EVEN months** at 7:00 pm via zoom. If you can't attend this meeting, we can set up a separate training session for you on Zoom.
