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A WORD FROM OUR SPONSORS

November is Gratitude Month

For many decades now, we in the Fellowship have formally carved out November as a time to express our collective gratitude for our individual sobriety. Interestingly, no one is exactly sure why that month was originally chosen, though its connection with Thanksgiving seems obvious. A.A. co-founder, Bill W. thought, for a while, that his sobriety had begun in November, but later calculations established the date of his new beginnings as December 11. Misty origins notwithstanding, Gratitude Month has, since the 1940s, been November and our shared thankfulness over the years has taken many forms and will continue to do so as our membership widens. The General Service Board began giving small gratitude dinners in the 1940s. These were precursors to the much larger Gratitude Luncheons that were orchestrated during the 1960s as a Public Information effort of G.S.O.

A.A. Traditions were the undeniable anchor of our new sober life, Bill W. thought when he wrote, "What then could be more appropriate than to set aside Thanksgiving week for discussion of the practical and spiritual values to be discovered in our Traditions?" The Tradition, he wrote in November 1949, "are a distillate of our experience of living and working together. They apply the spirit of the Twelve recovery Steps to our group life and security." (*The Language of the Heart*, p. 96) The first sealed and approved, official recognition of A.A. "Gratitude Week" to be specifically designated to coincide with **...Cont'd on Page 4**

On anvils of experience, the structure of our Society was hammered out. Thus has it been with A.A. By faith and by works we have been able to build upon the lessons of an incredible experience. They live today in the Twelve Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous, which—God willing—shall sustain us in unity for so long as He may need us. *—Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*, p. 131

STEP ELEVEN

Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.

Principle of the Step: Awareness

It was suggested in Step Ten that we continue to look at ourselves and our missteps in the maintenance of our spiritual condition, all of this in an effort to become more alert to the causes and conditions that continue to cause our failure on any given day. "After making our review, we ask God's forgiveness and inquire what corrective measure can be taken." (Big Book, pg 86.)

This "ask" is done through prayer, and the response to our "inquiry" comes to us in meditation. It's been said that the simple definition of **prayer is "talking to God"** and **meditation is "listening to God."** At days end, we look at where we've been resentful, selfish, dishonest or afraid. We determine if we owe an apology to someone and make sure that it is not just kept to ourselves.

We've determined if we were kind and loving toward all, or if we were thinking of ourselves most of the time instead of thinking how we could be helpful to others. We take any discrepancies in our daily spiritual work to God and ask that we be forgiven for them. Then we get quiet, get still and listen for God's direction for us on what our corrective measures should be.

<u>Now about meditation</u>: Many members of A.A. believe that God is found in the stillness – in the quiet. It's hard for us to be able to hear God's direction for us if our minds are running 90 miles an hour. Quietening the noise that lives between our ears is part of the work we do to begin

to listen (in meditation) for our corrective measures. Meditation has a hard time of it for many of us. But it's really quite simple. Just get still! We can do that anywhere. It doesn't have to be on a mountain top with our legs crossed and our fingers in the "ohm" position. It doesn't have to be with candles burning, soft music playing and silence all around us.

For many, this knowledge comes in the form of a "gut instinct," that deep inside knowing. Many an alcoholic has been led astray by following their heart and head, but have found great release when following their gut. Deep inside we know the direction God wants us to go, and when we listen to that direction, great events will come to pass for us. —from *takethe12.org*

Thanksgiving week, dates back to 1956. That year, at the Sixth General Service Conference, delegates approved a motion to that affect, stipulating that "this action be noted in the annual pre-Thanksgiving appeals to the groups for funds to help support A.A.'s worldwide services." Carrying the message, expressing gratitude, as well as wanting to make a gesture of appreciation for the numerous published articles, books, and radio and TV interviews to A.A. that year, were what motivated a number of Gratitude Luncheons. These were held, always in November, during the 1960s at New York City's Roosevelt Hotel—where, incidentally, members of the media might care to have a drink, were assured, in the invitation by General Service Board chairman (nonalcoholic) Dr. John l. Norris, that "cocktails will be served at 12:15 p.m. Library, and the luncheon will end promptly at 2:00 pm."

Well-attended functions, these luncheons drew a sizeable, widerange representation from the media, and served a double purpose: to thank the writers and commentators who attended for their contributions to A.A. in the preceding year and to, in the words of a G.S.O. memo written at the time, "advance A.A's public relations by bringing editors, publishers, writers and broadcasters in personal contact with sources of reliable information on the movement." A typical list of invitees to the 1965 luncheon, who had published articles and books on the Fellowship, were from The New York Times, Medical World News, McCall's Magazine, Macmillan Publishing Company, The Christian Science Monitor, and many other news and publishing organizations.

Bill W. always addressed the gatherings, as did Dr. Norris, and, in addition to a question and answer period at the end of the proceedings,

there was always plenty of A.A. literature available for the guests to take along. In 1965, Bill sent an autographed copy of the newly-released *A.A. Comes of Age* to each guest. Although those who came to the luncheons found them helpful and informative, the board thought they were too expensive a way to say thank you, when a letter from Bill, after an article or TV production was completed, would have been enough. Other voiced the opinion that more cooperation offered on articles or TV spots might have been more helpful. In any event, the luncheons were discontinued in 1968.—*Box* 459 VOL. 40, No. 5 OCTOBER-NOVEMBER 1994

Tradition Eleven (Long Form)

Our relations with the general public should be characterized by personal anonymity. We think A.A. ought to avoid sensational advertising. Our names and pictures as A.A. members ought not be broadcast, filmed, or publicly printed. Our public relations should be guided by the principle of attraction rather than promotion. There is never need to praise ourselves. We feel it better to let our friends recommend us.

Principle of Tradition 11 – Attraction

Bill W. once said, "We had no public relations policy except for a fear of public relations. Our relations with the general public should be characterized by personal anonymity."

Good public relations are A.A. lifelines reaching out to the fellow alcoholic who still does not know us. For years to come, our growth is sure to depend upon the strength and number of these lifelines.

Conversely, think about this: **Should we identify ourselves by our first and last name when** we speak at closed meetings of A.A? Does this violate the Eleventh Tradition?

Of course not. We are only anonymous at the level of press, radio, and films. The press has not attended any closed meetings I have spoken at, so I am free to use my whole name. The final paragraph on page 37 of the pamphlet "*Frequently Asked Questions About A.A.*" states: "It should also be noted that within A.A., at A.A. meetings and amongst themselves, A.A. members are not anonymous."

Step-Tradition Parallel

The Eleventh Step is related to the Eleventh Tradition: by praying only for knowledge of His will for me and the power to carry that out, I become a source of attraction to God and give Him all credit for my wonderful life. The Eleventh Step poses the question, "How can we improve our conscious contact?" The Eleventh Tradition answers that question by pointing out that when we do not take credit for the good we do, we become closer to God in our prayer. –from *Takethe12.org*

Concept Eleven (Long Form)

COOPERATION WITH THE PROFESSIONAL COMMUNITY (CPC)

The CPC Committee recently took several medical, nursing, and/or psychology students from Drexel to A.A. meetings so that the students could learn what A.A. is, what it is not, and what it does, so that they can better help suffering alcoholics when they graduate. As part of their class assignment, the students wrote essays about what they learned. Here is one that was shared with us.

What I Learned in A.A.

Coming into this experience I had very little knowledge of the workings of A.A. meetings or the people that attended them. I have known several people in my life who struggle with substance abuse and have seen the benefits of getting help. Having said that, actually attending meetings and seeing the inner workings of the program has been an illuminating experience.

Personally, attending A.A. meetings allowed me to reflect on and assess my own relationship with alcohol. I am grateful that I can responsibly enjoy alcohol in social settings but also recognize the importance of ensuring that relationship remains healthy. What I am most thankful for is the realization that we are all more alike than different and have the capacity to find encouragement through community and the support of others.

Alcoholism is a nonselective disease affecting people from all races, creeds, and classes. There is no "good picture" of an alcoholic. They are people first and deserve love and understanding in finding support for their afflictions. I met people from all walks of life, and their stories were both heartbreaking and inspiring.

I will never forget my first meeting, seeing a 22 year-old woman introducing herself as an alcoholic with 48 hours sobriety. It takes a lot of courage to bare your soul and struggles to an audience of strangers. I gathered from her story that this wasn't her first relapse, and it was incredibly moving to see her at a meeting two weeks later, and then several months later. Her continued sobriety taught me that as a future physician patience and empathy can save lives.

Something that I struggled with throughout this experience was the realization that as bad as you can want someone to get better, the outcome is out of your control. Your job, as both a physician and a human being, is to show up every day with love and empathy, and to keep showing up ready to help your patient continue to take steps forward. *—Auteri*

A.A. Guidelines

A.A. Guidelines are compiled from the shared experience of A.A. members in various service areas. They also reflect guidance given through the Twelve Traditions and the General Service Conference (U.S. and Canada). In keeping with our Tradition of autonomy, except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole, most decisions are made by the group conscience of the members involved. The purpose of these Guidelines is to assist in reaching an *informed* group conscience.

This helpful guide covers the application of Tradition Eleven in the modern Internet era, from how to set up an A.A. website, what to consider when posting speaker talks online, what to do about posting personal phone numbers on flyers, and much more! Here is just some of what this guideline has to say about the thorny issue of how to talk about one's sobriety on SOCIAL MEDIA without breaking your or any other member's anonymity.

GENERAL SOCIAL NETWORKING WEBSITES

Facebook and other social networking websites are public in nature. Though users create accounts and utilize usernames and passwords, once on the site, it is a public medium where A.A. members and non-A.A.s mingle. The platforms in and of themselves do not infringe on our principles. It is the actions of the individual that may cause harm to themselves, to others, or to A.A. as a whole. For that we are, each of us, individually responsible to our fellowship, to ourselves and to our personal higher powers.

Individual members can take clear steps to safeguard their own anonymity. For example, an individual or group might create an entirely anonymous social media account without use of their full name or face and for sharing about recovery only. Others may choose to use their names but not photographs of themselves. Both the letter and the spirit of the Eleventh Tradition are clear guideposts for our fellowship in this respect.

As long as individuals do not identify themselves as A.A. members, there is no conflict of interest. However, someone identifying themselves as an A.A. member using their full name and/or a likeness, such as a full-face photograph, would be contrary to the spirit of the Eleventh Tradition, which states in the Long Form that, "...our [last] names and pictures as A.A. members ought not be broadcast, filmed or publicly printed."

Experience suggests that it is in keeping with the Eleventh Tradition to not disclose A.A. membership on social networking sites as well as on any other website, blog, electronic bulletin board, etc., unless composed solely of A.A. members and password protected.

Websites and social networking offer individuals the chance to post a great deal of personal information about themselves (and others). Our experience suggests that some A.A.

members do not post anything that is "A.Á. jargon" on their personal profiles and in "status updates," while others feel it is alright to do so as long as A.A. or Alcoholics Anonymous is not mentioned. -MG-18 A.A. Guidelines on Internet \$.15



THIS MONTH IN A.A. HISTORY *** NOVEMBER ***

November 1, 1963: Reverend Sam Shoemaker, spiritual advisor to Bill W., died.

November 3, 2001: J. P. Miller who wrote the 1962 screenplay for *The Days of Wine and Roses*, an unflinching look about at a young couple dealing with alcoholism, died.


November 9, 1966: President Johnson appoints Marty M., one of the first women to get sober in A.A., to the First National Advisory Committee on Alcoholism.

November 11, 1934: Armistice Day (now known as Veterans Day: Bill W. started drinking again after a dry spell, beginning his last drunk. He would go on to have a spiritual experience in the hospital that change everything for him.

November 13, 1939: Bill W. wanted to go to work at Towns Hospital where he had his first spiritual experience; NY drunks wanted him to stay on as head of the fledgling A.A. movement. A.A. won.

November 14, 1940: The Alcoholic Foundation (now A.A. World Services) publishes the first *AA Bulletin*.

November 15, 1949: Bill W. suggests that groups devote Thanksgiving week to discussions of the Twelve Traditions.



November 18, 1946: The first Dublin, Ireland group met.

November 26, 1895: Bill W. was born in East Dorsett, VT.

November 28, 1939: Hank P., early A.A. member, wrote to Bill W. advocating autonomy for all A.A. groups. This suggestion would become enshrined in Tradition Four.

November 28, 1943: Bill W. was the guest speaker at San Quentin Penitentiary (sometimes dated Dec 2, 1943). **November 1934**: Ebby T., who got sober in the Oxford Group, carried the message to Bill W.

Other events in November for which we have no exact date:

November 1936: Fitz M. left Towns Hospital to become 'A.A. #3 in New York', with Bill W. and Hank P.


November 1937: Bill W. and Dr. Bob compare notes in Akron. They count forty cases staying sober. The Akron group meets to consider Bill's ideas for how to expand the movement: a book, A.A. hospitals, paid missionaries. Only the book idea gets approved.

November/Dec 1939: The Akron group withdrawals from association with Oxford Group. Meetings moved from T. Henry & Clarence Williams homes to Dr Bob's and other members' homes.


November 1945: Bill's article called *Those Goof Balls*, about the "Sleeping Pills Menace" was published in *AA Grapevine*.

November 1986: Big Book published in paperback.

November, 2001: First of 400,000 Fourth Edition Big Books arrives in the mail.
