A MEMBER SHARES

"Having Had a Spiritual Awakening..."

The Twelfth Step in the program of Alcoholics Anonymous is truly magnificent. In one sentence and two phrases, it gives us not only guidance in stopping drinking, but a guide to living a more useful and peaceful life.

My parents did a good enough job trying to instill the good qualities and life skills to get me through life. But the one thing I missed was the fact it would take a power greater than myself to activate these qualities. That left to my own devices I would surely fail. And fail I did. At a very early age I began to try and use self-will and self-knowledge to run my life.

Somehow I missed the part about surrender and asking for help. It wasn't till I was beaten down enough that I began to see that I needed to go to somewhere else, to someone greater than myself for help. Once I surrendered to my higher power, everything came easier. Gradually my spiritual "experience", not unlike Bill W's "road to Damascus" miracle, began to take hold, and eventually morphed into a lifetime spiritual "awakening."

Then came the second half of Step Twelve. Once I had the spiritual experience, I became a willing pilgrim, looking to improve all areas of my life. And that came through getting outside of myself and working with other alcoholics and addicts and beginning to incorporate a more selfless approach to life.

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STEP TWELVE

Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.



The One Thing I Need To Know About Step Twelve: Go Give It Away



This Step is divided into three very separate and distinct parts.

First, it assumes that as a result of taking Steps One through Eleven, we've actually had a spiritual awakening. Once we have taken the first Eleven Steps, it is widely believed that the alcoholic undergoes the kind of transformation needed to be able to actually be a different person. A spiritual awakening is nothing more than a psychic change that, among other things, eliminates our obsession to drink. It is that change that becomes the foundation to the second part of Step Twelve.

Second, going out and giving away what has been so freely given to us is the last and final written direction in our basic text. It's no mistake that giving away the message that one can

become recovered (not "cured") from a seemingly hopeless state of mind and body is the ultimate paradox in our program of recovery. It's in the giving that we receive. Working with others has been the bedrock so many members of A.A. have found that will not only carry them through the hard times in their own recovery, but will strengthen and inspire their willingness to continue to "trudge" (one definition: *to walk with purpose*) our "Road to Happy Destiny".



TRUDGE THE ROAD OF Happy Destiny

As the Big Book says, "Practical experience shows that nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking as intensive work with other alcoholics. It works when other activities fail. You can help when no one else can. " (page 89, "Working With Others").

This idea formed the basis of Bill's conversation with Dr. Silkworth shortly after his "white light" experience, described in *Bill's Story*. One of Bill's first thoughts (sitting on that bed) was that other people suffering from this illness could benefit from an understanding of what a personality change can look like for them too. It was this idea that eventually led Bill to Dr. Bob and what was to be a fifteen-minute first meeting turned into over five hours!

It is here that Part Three of Step Twelve starts. I get to practice these principles in all my affairs when I



realize that my experience can help you and your experience can help me in ways that nothing else can. Practicing each of our spiritual principles is truly found in teaching another alcoholic how to take the Twelve Steps of A.A. (and teaching them how to teach others). This will not only provide us self-centered alcoholics with a sense of joy in giving, but will help us to continue to uncover the flaws in our own character that continue to cause our failure along our journey.—breakdown by <u>takethetwelve.org</u>.



It means helping your spouse, friend, co-worker, or anyone in your life, who reaches out for help; no matter how inconvenient or menial the task seems. It means doing the right thing, even when all instincts say deny, lie, or flee.



When I live only "in my head" and not looking "outside" myself, I am in trouble. I need to begin concentrating on what other people need rather than my own self-centered "needs." Only then will I feel joy and serenity. Or, as they say, "the peace that passeth all understanding."

In the midst of the tragic floods in Nashville, people began seeing the best in each other. More than ever, Nashville felt like a community.

Alcoholism is another tragedy that separates friends, relatives, families, and co-workers. But in working together altruistically for each other, in the other person's behalf, we can find a healing "that passeth all understanding." Only through surrender and selflessness can we navigate through our own addictions. And, only through surrender and selflessness can we find true happiness and serenity.—*Walter Q., Cumberland Heights, OH*

Tradition Twelve (Long Form)

And finally, we of Alcoholics Anonymous believe that the principle of anonymity has an immense spiritual significance. It reminds us that we are to place principles before personalities; that we are actually to practice a genuine humility. This to the end that our great blessings may never spoil us; that we shall forever live in thankful contemplation of Him who presides over us all.

Principle of Tradition 12 – Principles before personalities

Principles First; People Second

Why are we repeatedly asked in the Traditions to give up ourselves for the greater good? The answer is because any relationship we have that does not involve sacrifice is a relationship that likely will not endure. Each tradition straightens out a disastrous attitude we had about relationships. The twelfth tradition teaches us that a spirit of sacrifice (often times through anonymity) is vital to good relationships.

Giving up the expectation of rewards for doing good is difficult for most of us. It's easy for us to give and then think, "Well, I'll get a reward, even if I don't get public recognition for what I did." To remove that reward symbol from the back of our minds for whatever good we do is part of practicing anonymity. The next time you hear a speaker in A.A. whose personality is exciting from the platform, see if you can hear the principles behind their words. To which Step, Tradition, or Concept can you relate their pitch? Setting ourselves aside and focusing on the principles of our program is a crucial component in the foundation we need for studying the Traditions and learning how to be in healthier relationships with our fellow A.A.'s and with those in the world around us.

Step-Tradition Parallel

The Twelfth step poses the question, "What is a spiritual awakening?" I believe that the evidences of a spiritual awakening are found in a person who practices the Twelfth Tradition in all their affairs. Such a person sacrifices self in order to practice principles. Their motive in practicing all of the Traditions is anonymity: they sacrifice to help others.—breakdown by <u>takethetwelve.org</u>

Concept Twelve (Long Form)

General Warranties of the Conference: in all its proceedings, the General Service Conference shall observe the spirit of the A.A. Tradition, taking great care that the Conference never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus an ample reserve, be its prudent financial principle; that none of the Conference Members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decisions be reached by discussion, vote, and, whenever possible, by substantial unanimity; that no Conference action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that, though the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.



THE SEPIA OFFICE WILL BE CLOSED FOR THE HOLIDAYS ON: MONDAY, DECEMBER 25TH (CHRISTMAS DAY) MONDAY, JANUARY 1ST, 2024 (NEW YEAR'S DAY)



Today, the region that SEPIA serves is divided into five Zones, each with their own service representatives, to help every group communicate with its Central Office, or SEPIA, as efficiently as possible. Each Zone corresponds with the county in which it is located: Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Montgomery, and Philadelphia. But this wasn't always the case. Before the mid 1990's, every Intergroup Rep had to travel to the monthly Intergroup meeting in Philadelphia to get information from SEPIA and to sign up for commitments. As a result, some groups felt disconnected from Intergroup, especially those located far away from the Philadelphia office. Here is the story about how the Zones got started, as told by a member who was involved in making it happen.

The problem SEPIA was facing (in the early 90's) was one of not being able to do business because we never could meet the Quorum requirements of our by-laws:

- Month 1. Cannot meet the Quorum of one-third
- Month 2. Commitment month (no vote held)
- Month 3. Cannot meet the Quorum
- Month 4. Commitment month
- Month 5. Can't meet Quorum of ten percent
- Month 6. Commitment month
- Month 7. Simple majority. It took four to six months to do business.

We were fiscally poor, "broke." I remember we ran out of Third Edition Big Books to sell. Group donations were way, way down. There was a feeling of discontent among many of the groups.

As a past Archives Director I was familiar with the previous attempt to form a Zone. My friend Wilmore investigated and asked the Reps to consider this process. It was being used in Washington state (Seattle) and in California (Los Angeles). The Reps voted it down even after hearing from a Zone which had operated for a year.

Several past Delegates of EPGSA along with several past Intergroup Presidents, met at an Advisory Meeting at the Intergroup office, which at the time was located at 1218 Chestnut Street in Philadelphia. The idea of setting up the Intergroup as districts was put forth. They suggested the same structure that the Intergroup gave Area 59 when they helped set up the Area in Eastern PA (EPGSA). But nothing was done about it.

In 1994 or '95, David St. P. was Intergroup President. He discussed seating Intergroup reps at the next Intergroup meeting, which was held at the FOP building, Lodge Five, by District. This is where God stepped in to show us the way. In all of Chester County, there were only three or four Intergroup Reps. I was sitting under the balloon that said "District 44." John P. of the Red Fox Group came to us and said he was sitting by himself, and asked if he could sit with us. The Intergroup Reps in 30 also found us. The sitting by District made the individual Reps sitting by Districts look and feel too small. The Area never started in such defined districts. I looked at early Area structure and it was much smaller—one to twelve if I remember correctly. We told the Intergroup Reps that we would organize Zones by the counties. We started with Chester County.

A couple of years later, John H., a past Intergroup President, showed me the Seventh Tradition contribution (to SEPIA) information. The Chester County Zone was now two to three years old and functioning.

The trustees Literature Committee is seeking stories from A.A. members with diverse backgrounds. This is in response to the 2022 Conference Advisory Action that the trustees' Literature Committee revise the pamphlet "Do You Think You're Different?" to update the stories to represent greater diversity.

The Trustees' Literature Committee requested that consideration be given to stories from multicultural populations, stories from A.A. members whose experience reflects multiple factors, and from diverse populations not addressed in other current A.A. literature.

Please encourage members in your area to write their personal stories for possible inclusion in the revised pamphlet "Do You Think You're Different." Stories should reflect "in a general way what we used to be like, what happened, and what we are like now."

manuscript should be retained for your files. The anonymity of all authors will be observed whether their story is selected for publication or not.

We learned that the Big Book is written in 70 languages and there are 65 GSO's around the world. As a member of the Archives Committee, I was especially honored to go back into the Archives room to sit on the sofa and just relax with all the history around.

If you haven't taken the trip to GSO (your world headquarters) I suggest that you get there by bus, plane, train or automobile. It was amazing to learn the depth of this worldwide and life-saving, lifechanging fellowship. I thank God for saving my life, A.A. for giving me my sober life, and all those who serve at our local office, in the County Zones, and in the meetings doing service.--Howard S, New Chester Group

THIS MONTH IN A.A. HISTORY **DECEMBER*****

- **December 1938--**Bill W. wrote the Twelve Steps over the course of this month.
- **December 10, 1975--**Birds of a Feather, an A.A. group for pilots, was formed in the Pacific Northwest, saving countless lives and careers.
- December 10, 1934-- Bill W., who would go on to be a co-founder of A.A., was admitted to Towns ٠ Hospital in New York City to "dry out" for the fourth and last time.
- **December 12, 1934--**Bill W. had a spiritual experience at Towns Hospital. His doctor, Dr. Silkworth, (author of *The Doctor's Opinion* in the Big Book) tells Bill he doesn't understand what happened to him, but that he'd "better hang on to it".
- December 12, 1937--Bill W., Dr. Bob, and a few early A.A. members appeal to the Rockefeller Foundation for money to help the fledgling fellowship survive. John D. Rockefeller loved the movement but declined to donate, saying that "money would spoil this thing." Though greatly disappointed at the time, Bill W. would express his deep gratitude later for this nudge to make A.A. self-supporting.

December 20, 1945--Rowland H., who carried the Oxford Group message to ٠ Ebby T., died. Rowland's alcoholism had been pronounced "utterly hopeless" by none other than Dr. Carl Jung, unless he had a "vital spiritual experience". He found one with the Oxford Group and passed the message on to Ebby, who passed it on to Bill W., thus setting the stage for A.A.'s formation.

- December 1950--The Grapevine publishes an article signed by both Bill W. and Dr Bob recommending establishing the A.A. General Service Conference.
- December 1955--The Man on the Bed painting by Robert M., a volunteer illustrator with the ٠ Grapevine, was published with the title Came to Believe. It was changed in 1973 when the book of the same name was published.
- **December 1982--**Nell Wing, A.A.'s first Archivist, retired from the ٠ General Service Office (G.S.O.) after 35 years of service. A nonalcoholic, she started with G.S.O as a receptionist and Bill W.'s secretary when she was 29 years old.

Other events for which we have no exact date:

- December 1934 to May 1935--Bill W. worked with alcoholics-low-٠ bottom drunks, all-trying to give away what he has found, but gets discouraged when he fails to sober up any of them. His wife Lois reminded him that HE is sober, so it was not all in vain.
- **December 1939--**The first A.A. group in a mental institution was formed in Rockland State Hospital, New York.
- **December 1939--**The Matt Talbot Club's 88 members used ٠ wagons to collect old furniture to recondition and sell. They were not A.A., but used the A.A. program and material. This was the first effort reach alcoholics outside the married, middle-class category.

The Chester Zone had gone from three or four groups contributing to twenty to thirty groups contributing, all of which now felt a part of their Intergroup. The active groups were able to handle all the Institution meetings in Chester County and were recruiting more. They had got a lot of the members cleared for the prisons and met all the commitments there. They had even started a Public Information committee.

Meanwhile, a graph of the contributions for Bucks, Delaware, and Montgomery Counties showed that there had been no increase in contributions during this time. They were flat lines. Philadelphia actually showed a decrease in contributions.

Then John H. showed me a graph of Chester County contributions, confirming a steady increase in contributions. He told me emphatically that I needed to do for the other counties what I did in Chester County. I told him it was "We", not "Me".

John H. said the situation was dire. SEPIA had no money, no prudent reserve, and ran out of Big Books on a regular basis. Literature was being taken and not paid for. They put it behind a wire mesh to stop theft. These were desperate times.—*Shakey Mike G*.


