How Tradition Two Saved Me From Myself

I am extremely grateful for the program of Alcoholics Anonymous for saving my life and restoring me back to my Godgiven sanity. Furthermore, I am grateful for the men and women that came before me who carried on the Traditions of our society so that alcoholics like me can have this program for our recovery and restoration. And when I speak of these men and women I'm speaking of the "old timers", or as the *Twelve and Twelve* refer to them, "the elder statesman". I credit and appreciate these men and women, including the ones that are still with us, for having the ability to put their egos and self-centeredness aside in order to accommodate Tradition Two by not allowing themselves to get caught up in wanting to be "the producer". Not all members were able to do that in order to preserve our Traditions and the Big Book tells us that those who could not adhere to these spiritual principles were likely to drink again.

As an active member of A.A. with a variety of service commitments ranging from Secretary to Intergroup Rep to General Service Rep, I would have to admit how tempting it gets from time to time to attempt to control certain situations in certain groups, especially when it's not going the way I think it should!

STEP TWO

Came to believe that a power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.

The One Thing I Need To Know About Step 2:

The Solution To My Problem Isn't Me

In Step One, we learned our problem wasn't alcohol - it was/is our mental state (our thinking) that was the crux of the real problem. How perfect it is that just ten pages later (page 45, "We Agnostics"—4th Edition), Bill W. shared with us the solution to that problem: "Lack of power, that was our dilemma. We had to find a power by which we could live, and it had to be a Power greater than ourselves. That's exactly what this book is about. Its main object is to enable you to find a Power greater than yourself which will solve your problem."

Check! How simple is that? This one of twelve simple suggestions is much easier than I ever imagined. I thought solving the drink problem was going to be insurmountable. When I figured out that it's not a **drinking** problem I need to solve, but a **thinking** problem—and that simply believing there is a Power out there that is greater than I am that can help me solve it—well, that made life much easier to bear.

I then get to ask myself why I shouldn't apply to life's problems this same readiness to change my point of view. I was having problems with relationships, couldn't control my emotions, was prey to misery and depression, couldn't make a living, had a feeling of uselessness, was full of fear, was unhappy and couldn't be of help to others. I was/am "maladjusted to life, in full flight from reality and an outright mental defective" (B.B. - Doctor's Opinion - Page xxvi - 4th Edition). All of this was true until the day came I could finally believe that a Power greater than myself could run my life better than I could - and all I had to do was let it.

MYTHS ABOUT THIS STEP: Your higher power has to be God. This is a big misconception in Alcoholics Anonymous. Your higher power can be anything that you believe in that is greater than you: the Universe, nature, humanity, Allah, Buddha, or even A.A itself. Another thing to remember is that your Higher Power doesn't need to have a gender (even though in 1939, Bill W. felt it easier to use one for our basic text). A.A doesn't require you to believe in anything that you don't want to; each step is a suggestion along the road to a sober life.





But by the grace of God and the spiritual principles of this program I am able to step back from the situation and check my motives, and only then am I able to spare myself from becoming the "bleeding deacon" of the group, saving myself from the demoralizing feeling of embarrassment as consequence of my ego and self-centeredness. I have to believe that God flows through the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous and even though our interpretations of God may vary, I strongly believe that He works in our groups as a whole by giving the groups our necessary strength, tolerance, compassion, openmindedness, willingness, and honesty... resulting in the only authority

to do it and I'll tell you what it is..."

*There's only one way

that can maintain the necessary respect that's required to keep our groups and A.A. as whole in perfect order and out of the hands of one man or woman.

I trust God as our group's authority; therefore I will have to trust in the process of "group law" and "majority rule" as long as the group does not stray from The Traditions, which in my opinion are a part of the simple laws for our society in the rooms of A.A. recovery. This process has been working for over 85 years and I don't see any reason why it shouldn't continue to work for a lifetime and more. It is critical that we take on the responsibility to preserve the program of Alcoholics Anonymous for all generations to follow. Let's adhere to the spiritual principles of the Traditions without deviation so that this program remains attractive for those who still need to arrive, such as our children, grandchildren, and all other future alcoholics looking for recovery. We know this program saves lives, it saved ours!!

I thank God and every member of Alcoholics Anonymous for saving my life and restoring my sanity! May peace be with you! Elder Statesman vs. Bleeding Deacon



From Wit And Wisdom of Alcoholics Anonymous:

The program is easier to digest—for me—by replacing "Higher Power" with "Higher Wisdom." From this perspective I was suffering from ignorance and illusion. Recovery became the pursuit of Wisdom; only a Higher Wisdom could restore me to sanity. This Higher Wisdom came from A.A. and from my deep internal knowing accessed through prayer and meditation.

I also know people who reject the notion of a mystical "Higher Wisdom." Instead they just practice the Second Step by saying, a "higher understanding" or a "deeper understanding" can restore them to sanity." #2718, p. 434, Wit And Wisdom of Alcoholics Anonymous: Lessons on Living from 25 Years in the Halls of Recovery by Sharabi (and a Thousand Alcoholics), Alpine Lake Publishing 2012.

TRADITION TWO (Long Form)

For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as he may express himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants, they do not govern.

Overriding idea of Tradition Two: God Speaks Through His Kids

In a relationship based upon the Traditions there is no such thing as individual authority. All decisions are arrived at by a majority agreement, reached after all elements of the problem or situation have been considered and a Higher Power has been contacted for guidance in the making of the decisions (an informed group conscience). Unfortunately, however, many times our relationships are unhealthy due to the dominance of one person or the other. The uninformed often times feels he/she has the ability to "know best" for its individual participants and tries to impose this attitude of "playing God" in the relationship.

All my life I feared authority. I had a very strange idea about it. I didn't like anybody else's authority. I only liked my own authority. Maybe it is not so strange if you're a sick alcoholic like me. But I certainly did not have any respectful attitude for authority.

My first successful experience in not being fearful of authority was in A.A.. I did not fear my sponsor but relied on him. I saw my sponsor as the expression of a loving God. My second experience in not being fearful was when I started listening to the group conscience. The more I followed what I heard in A.A. through the group conscience, the better my life became. Gradually I have extended this trust in the group in A.A. to that of the world. Tradition Two encourages me to listen in order to have good relationships with you and to trust you as part of the group conscience. God may, just may, be speaking through you. Life forces me to become either an elder statesman or a bleeding deacon. The group conscience will correct me if I am out of line and I have a choice to complain like a bleeding deacon or lead by humble example like an elder statesman.



CONCEPT II (Short Form)

The General Service Conference of A.A. has become, for nearly every practical purpose, the active voice and the effective conscience of our whole society in its world affairs.

One thing you need to know: The Conference Listens—Then Speaks

Concept I establishes the "final responsibility and ultimate authority" of the A.A. groups; but, in actual practice, how are they to manage A.A.'s service affairs? By delegation, Concept II declares. Bill W. and Dr. Bob, entrusted by the early groups to get the program going and to spread the message, found non-alcoholic friends to help them.

They formed a trusteeship and delegated to it the responsibility for finances, the Big Book and other literature, public information, the General Service Office and the AA Grapevine. However, as the trustees constantly looked to the co-founders for advice and guidance and the groups also continued to hold them accountable, it was evident that the leadership should be transferred to the A.A. groups as a whole. But if the groups were to carry on their primary purpose, they would have to delegate their leadership role to a General Service Conference.



THIS MONTH IN A.A. HISTORY

*** FEBRUARY***

- **February, 1981:** The first Issue of *Markings*, A.A. Archive's newsletter, was published. It run until the Summer of 2016, when it was discontinued. Back issues are available at: https://www.aa.org/markings-newsletter.
- **February 2, 1942:** Bill W. paid tribute to Ruth Hock, A.A.'s first paid secretary and a non-alcoholic, who resigned to get married. In her career, she had replied to approximately 15,000 letters to people who asked for help.
- February 8, 1940: Bill W., Dr. Bob, and six other A.A.'s gave a presentation for 60 rich philanthropic friends of John D. Rockefeller Jr. at the Union Club in New York. Rockefeller himself, stating that, "money would ruin" the movement, granted them a only \$5,000 stipend for Bill W's living expenses. It was far less than they had envisioned. It also forced A.A. to become self-supporting. Bill W. would later express gratitude for this.
- February 11, 1938: Clarence Snyder ("Home Brewmeister" in 1st, 2nd & 3rd editions) had his last drink. He became an A.A. pioneer, first going through the Steps with Dr. Bob and then becoming the first member to initiate "Big Book sponsorship", wherein a member works one-on-one with a new A.A. and takes them through the Big Book.
- February 13, 1940: With about two years of sobriety, travelling salesman Jim B. ("The Vicious Cycle") moved to the Philadelphia area and started the first Philadelphia A.A. group, the fourth city to have one (after Akron, New York, and Cleveland).
- **February 14, 1971:** A.A. groups worldwide held a memorial service for Bill Wilson who died on January 24th 1971.
- **February 18, 1943:** A.A.'s were granted the right to use cars for Twelfth-Step work in emergency cases, despite gas rationing due to World War II.
- **February 19, 1939:** Father "John Doe" (Ralph P.) the first Catholic Priest in A.A., died. He was the author of numerous short books on sobriety that are still in print today including *Sobriety And Beyond* and *The Golden Book of Resentments*.

• **February 21, 1939:** 400 copies of the Big Book manuscript were sent to doctors, judges, psychiatrists, and others for comment. This unedited edition is known as the "multilith" Big Book.

- February 23, 1959: A.A. granted the Library of Congress Recording for the Blind service permission to tape the Big Book. These "talking books" are available for free to the blind.
- February 28, 1940: The first organizational meeting of Philadelphia A.A. was held at McCready Huston's room at 2209 Delancey Place.

The C-1 cassette player, developed in 1981 for the Library of Congress "talking books" program. No longer in production, they are a hot commodity on the underground music market for their ability to run tape at slower speeds.


