A Brief History of the Round-Up

It all began on April 13, 1967 when the Steering Committee, after much discussion, approved Ted R. to head a committee to look into a hotel or motel for about 100 A.A. members for a weekend in Atlantic City. This was envisioned to be an Intergroup workshop-type of thing called a "Spring Round-Up," that would eventually be sponsored by the Philadelphia Intergroup. On June 8, Ted advised the Steering Committee that a contract had been made with the Deauville Motel in Atlantic City.

The Round-Up was held on Mother's Day in May of 1968 at the Deauville. Some of the members involved with this first Round-Up including Ted R. were: Charles C., President; Jack K., Vice President; Ralph B., Director, Prison Committee; John (Jeff) J., Director, Public Information Committee; Marvin G., Executive Secretary—Office. All agreed it was a success and that it should be continued each year.

The Round-Up remained at the Deauville in Atlantic City until May of 1984 when, due to the opening of the casinos, it left Atlantic City and moved south to the Flanders Hotel in Ocean City. In 1985, it moved again to the Grand Hotel in Wildwood Crest. In 1989, it moved further south to the Grand Hotel in Cape May.

For a few years, the Round-Up moved up to the Pocono Mountains. But the fellowship preferred the beach, so it moved back to Ocean City, New Jersey. It then moved back to Cape May's Grand Hotel.

In 2020, just as preparations for another great year in Cape May were underway, the COVID pandemic shut everything down. The Round-Up transitioned online. Despite the fact that there were only a few weeks to pull it together, the SEPIA's first online Round-Up was a success! The silver lining was members that lived far away were now able to attend. In 2021, COVID was still a threat, so the Round-Up met online again.

By 2022, the Round-Up went back to meeting in person in Cape May, and the fellowship was overjoyed. In 2023, the Grand Hotel had other ideas for the space, so the Round-Up moved to the Showboat Hotel in Atlantic City. The fellowship let us know they preferred the Grand, so we are back there in 2024, at a new, earlier date.

Why Do I Have To Pay a Registration Fee?

In A.A., there are special workshops, conventions, and conferences that are held around the world. The most common misconception about these gatherings is that they are regular A.A. meetings, and since "there are no dues and fees for AA membership," members should not have to pay to participate if they do not wish to. However, workshops, conventions, and conferences are *special events*, not regular A.A. meetings.

The Round-Up is a special event that requires months of planning and preparation by SEPIA staff members and Committee volunteers, as well a lot of money, to present. Since all of the events are held at a hotel, there are fees (which go up every year!) for the use of the meeting rooms, the hospitality room, the lobby to set up registration tables, internet use, etc. Other expenses include coffee supplies, office supplies, printing costs, and postage. All of these are paid for through the cost of the registration. Unlike regular meetings, no baskets are passed in the meetings to raise these funds.

STEP THREE

Came to believe that a power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.

Decisions are wonderful. Decision is defined as "making up one's own mind." Decisions resolve conflicts. For many, the conflict over drinking and not wanting to drink made a Third Step decision relatively simple. We were happy to turn over our drinking problem to God as we understood God. However, for many of us, we were not so willing to turn over other areas of our lives so readily.

This step helps shift our mindset from thinking directly into action. It opens the door to conforming our will to that of our Higher Power's. Step Three is the first Step that requires real and continuous action. The first two Steps focus on reflection and introspection. In Step Two, we learned to believe in a Power greater than ourselves (some call that faith). Step Three allows us the place to solidify and act on our newfound faith in ways we never knew possible before coming to the rooms – some call that *trust*.

Have you ever wondered why (in the Third Step Prayer) we "offer ourselves to Thee?" Answer: So our Higher Power can "build with us and do with us as it will." Have you ever wondered why we ask HP to "relieve us of the bondage of self?" Answer: So that "we may better do HP's will." Have you ever wondered why we ask HP to "take away our difficulties?" Answer: So that we fully understand that "victory over them may bear witness to those we would help of HP's power, love and way of life."

I heard someone share in a meeting once about Step Three that it's like when you take your car to a mechanic to have them fix or service it. You trust that they will be able to get it all tuned up and ready to give back to you. They don't want to keep your car, they just want to get it in good working order so you can move on down the road. Making the decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God (trusting God) is much the same thing.



As we've learned in our basic text, the spiritual life is not a theory – we must live it. This means we need to begin putting in practice those things that will ultimately be the foundation to the personality change sufficient to bring about recovery from alcoholism (once again proving that alcohol is not now, nor has it ever been the problem). It has been said that "We thought faith said, "I'll take away the pain and discomfort," but what it ended up really saying was, "I'll sit with you in it. I'm here with you and we can walk through this together." -breakdown by takethe12.org.

CONCEPT THREE

To insure effective leadership, we should endow each element of A.A. the Conference, the General Service Board and its service corporations, staffs, committees, and executives—with a traditional "Right of Decision.

There will be times where we'll need to trust our trusted servants to make decisions without a group or service entities approval. Concept One & Concept Two by themselves cannot ensure smooth operation of A.A. business. There will be times that full facts (additional background information) and debate not available to groups, will help further inform our trusted servants and their decisions (and their votes on our behalf).

Those decisions may ultimately differ from original conscience's given to them when we ask them to vote on our behalf – but those differently made decisions are vital in allowing them to be more than mere messengers. They have a brain, let's let them use it.—breakdown by takethe12.org.

TRADITION THREE

The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking.

No "Crackpots" or "Fallen Women" Need Apply: The Checkered History of Tradition Three

A.A.'s Third Tradition states that "The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking". When you think about it, this is a pretty low bar. Unlike nearly every other organization on the planet, A.A. does not require that you believe in anything, pay anything, do anything, or even sign anything to become an A.A. member. You don't even have to be sober. Though certain meetings might kick you out for the night if you're drunk and disorderly, A.A. itself will never revoke your membership. You are a member of A.A. if you say you are. As Bill W. wrote in the *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*, "No matter who you are, no matter how low you have gone, no matter how grave your emotional complications—even your crimes—we still can't deny you A.A."

However, this wasn't always the case. The *Twelve* and *Twelve* came out in 1953, fourteen years after publication of the Big Book. These were fourteen exciting but difficult years during which A.A. experienced many growing pains. As hard as it is might be to believe today, in the early days, A.A. seemed to be very fragile entity. Growth was slow, and many alcoholics didn't make it. With no other options for recovery from this devastating disease, many A.A. members worried about the survival of their group as well as their own sobriety.

As one early A.A. member put it, "Everybody was scared witless that somebody or something would capsize the boat and drop us all back into the drink." In response to this fear, each group made up their own "membership rules" designed to exclude those they considered to be a potential threat to the group's stability. One day, the Foundation Office (known as the General Service Office today) compiled these rules from around the country, and the resulting list of people who were excluded from A.A. was mind-boggling.



According to our early member, the list included the following: "Beggars, tramps, asylum inmates, prisoners, queers, plain crackpots, and fallen women." Some groups went so far as to allow only what they called "pure alcoholics"--people who had no other issues beyond the consequences of their "guzzling". As quaint as some of these terms sound today, these exclusionary practices were no laughing matter. Put if this way: If you'd ever been arrested, hospitalized, or homeless; if you had a mental illness, were LGBTQ, were single mother, or were divorced, you might have been excluded from your local A.A. group. You also might also have be excluded if you used drugs, didn't believe in God, or weren't white. The consequences of these practices to the individuals cut off from A.A., the only recovery game in town, were devastating.



So what happened? How did we got from so many closed-minded rules to just one welcoming guiding principle? Basically, trial and error. Experience over time showed that the alcoholics that were considered "problematic" were just as likely to recover and become solid, contributing members of A.A. as anyone else. At the same time, A.A. as an organization proved more flexible and stronger than it first appeared. Too, members began to realize that that to take away an alcoholic's

full chance at recovery was wrong, as it might well be condemning that person to a life of alcoholic misery or death. Over time, membership rule after membership rule was stripped away, until finally we were left only with what works: Tradition Three.—*Kris H., Philadelphia, PA*


Dear Friends and Fellows:



THIS MONTH IN A.A. HISTORY

*** MARCH***

- March-May, 1938: Bill W., A.A.'s co-founder, begins writing the book Alcoholics Anonymous, aka The Big Book. Works Publishing Inc. was established to raise money to support the writing and printing of the book by selling shares.
- March, 1941: The second printing of the Big Book was released with some changes to the wording of Step Twelve. The term "spiritual experience" was changed to "spiritual awakening" and "as the result of those steps" was changed to "as the result of these steps". Also, "Appendix II—Spiritual Experience" was added to clarify the difference between a "spiritual experience" and a "spiritual awakening".
- March, 1946: The March of Time: Problem Drinkers, a
 documentary news film, began production with the
 cooperation of the New York Central Office. It was the first
 public film about A.A. work. It can still be found online today.



♦ March 1, 1941: Jack Alexander's Saturday Evening Post article about A.A. was published. A.A. membership jumped from 2,000 to 8,000 by years' end as a result. It is reproduced in pamphlet # P-12. (\$.30)



- March 3 1947: Nell Wing, a non-alcoholic, started work at the Alcoholic Foundation as Bill Wilson's secretary, replacing Ruth Hock, who had retired. Wing would go on to become A.A.'s first archivist, amassing a trove of invaluable historical materials.
- ◆ March 4, 1891: Lois Burnham was born in Brooklyn Heights, NY. She would go on to marry Bill W. and later to become a co-founder of Al-Anon.
- March 7, 1940: Bill W. and Lois visited the new P-12, \$.30 Philadelphia-area A.A. group, which had been founded a month earlier. It was the fourth city to establish an A.A. group, after Akron, New York, and Cleveland.
- March 16, 1940: The Alcoholic Foundation & Works Publishing moves from borrowed space in Newark, NJ to 30 Vesey St in lower Manhattan. This location became our first headquarters.
- ◆ March 20, 1995: The New Yorker published an article called A.A. at the Crossroads, which wondered whether A.A. was still able to get its message across to modern society.
- March 25, 1898: Jim B., the founder of A.A. in Philadelphia and author of the Big Book story *The Vicious Cycle*, was born.




